I recently rediscovered a letter written to me by Barry Callan earlier this year thanking me for a small donation passed on to him by a visitor to Nairobi. As a visitor to Africa on two occasions, I have become aware of the work that Barry has undertaken and the efficiency with which his ministry is conducted. The Ruben Centre has thrived under this care.

A walk in the surrounding neighbourhood, highlights the importance of the dignity — in terms of education, health care and community outreach — offered to those who access the Ruben Centre. The work Barry has diligently undertaken over many years, like so many working in Africa, is far from glamorous. Barry has forged many productive partnerships with the Australian High Commission and others in order to improve the lives of those in the surrounding district.

As the principal of St Joseph's College, our community is proud to claim Barry as an old collegian. He is a fine example of one who has lived a life which has embraced the values of the Gospel. The fact that he finds time to thank others for assisting him, highlights the value he places on human relationships and helps explain why he has been able to positively influence the lives of so many others.

I left Sudan at the end of June bowed, broken, bruised, bloodied and brought low by my failure to connect with the Zande people there.

As I reflect on the experience I recall other 'b word times' in my life, like learning to ride a horse in the 60s and, after falling off, hearing, 'You're not dead, so stop making a fuss and get back on!' That same advice worked again for me this year, when I arrived at Ruben in Nairobi. I simply immersed myself in the experience and immediately felt lifted up and moving effortlessly forward again with everything.

Ruben Centre is the heart of a huge slum in Nairobi and an absolute treasure to hundreds of men, women and children who live there and I quote from the Ruben Strategic Plan.

A keyhole view of Ruben Centre

A Mother enters the Centre and brings her smallest child to the nursery school, the next one to the primary school, before finally delivering the oldest to the Vocation Training Centre. After completing that task, she gets a tooth pulled out, then visits the clinic for a basic health check and, for good measure, gets an HIV test and counseling.

She goes on to seek help from the social worker and then join a group to strengthen her financial capacity with MEDA micro-finance services. Then, this parent checks in on her



neighbors who have brought their HIV+ child for a health check and food supplements with the Lea Toto program. Finally before leaving the Centre, she visits the Police station to see if there is any progress with the investigation into the robbery that occurred at her house the previous night.
